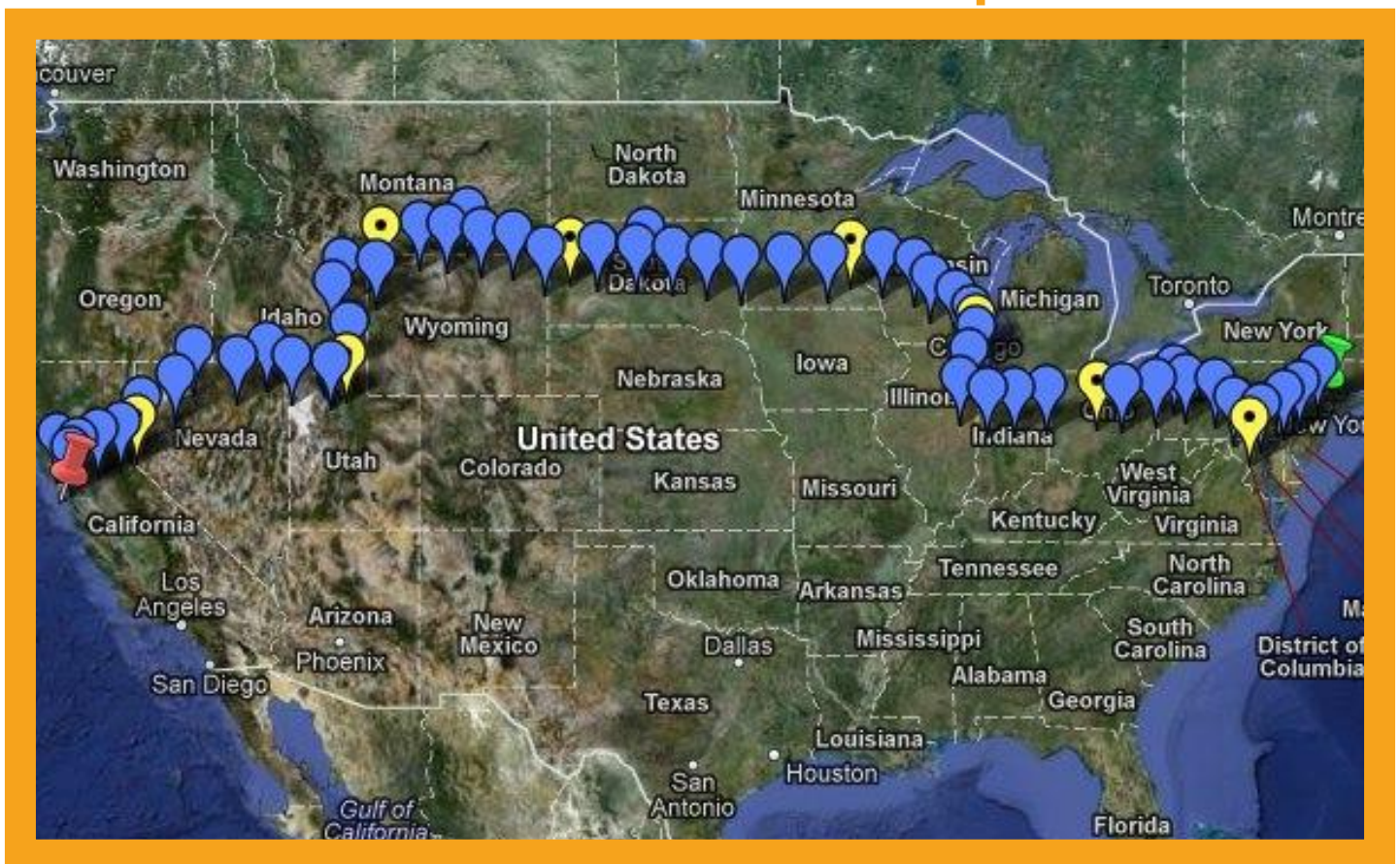

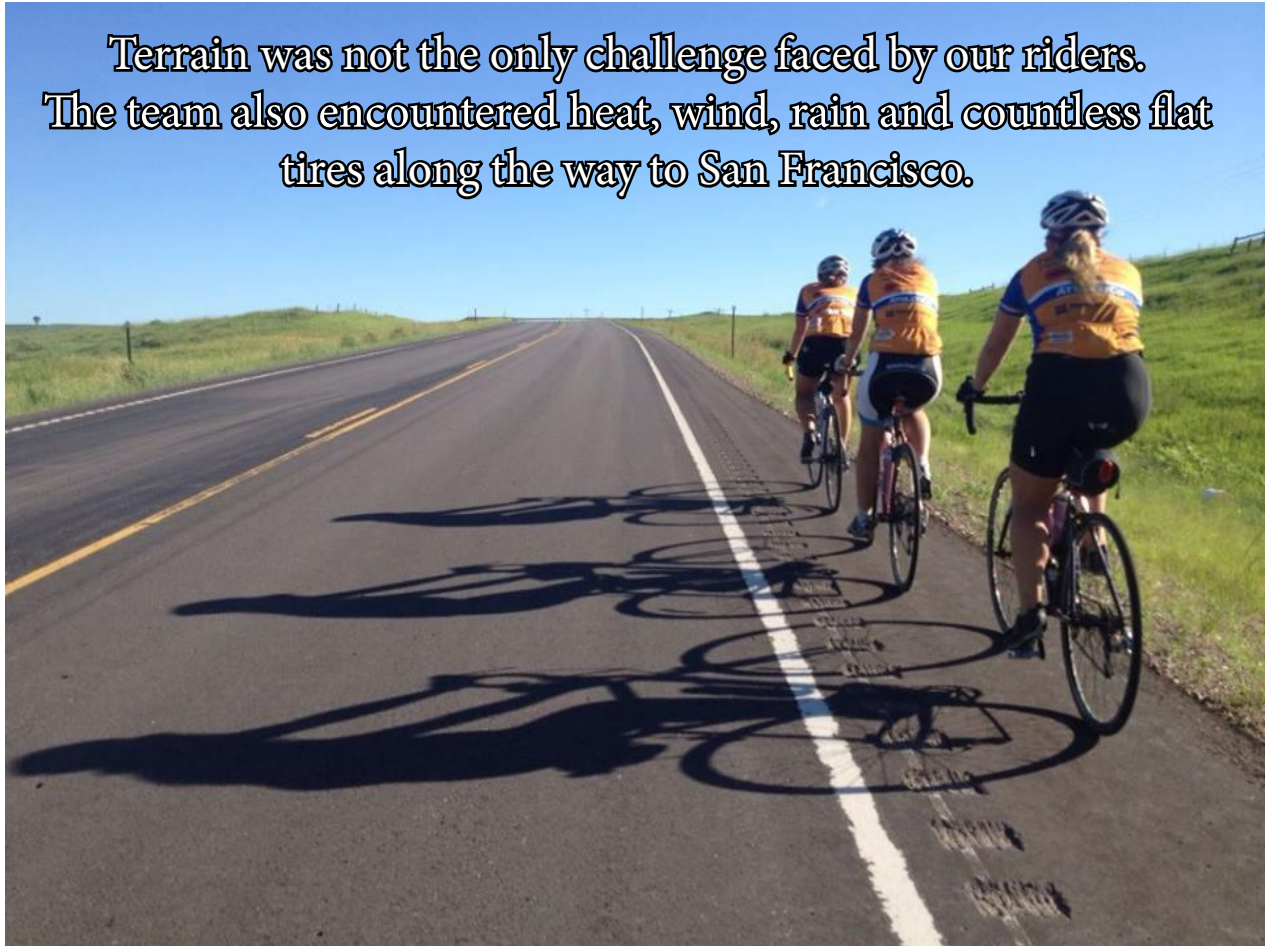

2013 Ride Recap



The 2013 Illini 4000 team embarked on their journey, barely knowing each other, and knowing even less about what the summer had in store for them. On May 25th, they began pedaling from New York City. 4,188 miles and 68 days lie between the team and San Francisco. As the summer began to fly by, the days consisted of biking, eating, and sleeping, with lots of laughs, songs, and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. The team became accustomed to sleeping on floors and going days without showers. With every mile, the team of 22 got closer.

By the time this year's I4K team began to forge all new territory, up the Teton Pass and through Idaho, Utah, and Nevada, biking had become second nature. The challenge of riding everyday became more mental than physical with over 3,000 miles behind them. Heat, headwinds, rocky roads, and steep climbs gave them every reason to quit; however, knowing there was a stay over waiting or a plateau at the top of the mountain was relief enough to continue onward.

Knowing that people affected by cancer do not know when the pain will stop kept the team going. Each day, they dedicated their ride to loved one affected by cancer, and that not only brought the team closer together, but also kept them grounded in the Illini 4000 cause. Along the way, the team met with some of the researchers who benefit from Illini 4000 funds. These men and women have dedicated their lives to finding cures, treatments, and therapies for those with cancer. This inspired the team, and again, kept them pedaling.

Finally, while certainly humbled by our country's amazing and expansive landscape, it was truly the people they met who made the trip memorable. The team experienced kindness and generosity from people across the country. People cooked delicious meals, offered floors to sleep on, and opened up showers to the team. The people of this country are truly amazing. It was both an unforgettable and successful summer for both the team and the organization, having raised \$115,000 for cancer research and patient support services.

The Portraits Project

During the trek across the country, the Illini 4000 Bike America Team interviews cancer patients and survivors from all walks of life. Each Portrait adds to the Project's goal: an enduring and evolving representation of cancer's effect on American life. The Project illustrates how individuals respond to cancer based on religious beliefs, location, and socioeconomic status. Since its inception in 2007, the Illini 4000 has recorded over one hundred of these stories.

A Word from our Director of the Portraits Project

It's not every day that you see a group of 22 sweaty, span-dex-wearing college students taking over a gas station or roadside café.

Sometimes, people would simply give us a strange look and walk away. But many times, they would approach us and ask questions. We loved these opportunities to tell them about I4K and one of its most important features—the Portraits Project.

The Portraits Project is a collection of narratives that documents the American cancer experience and gives patients, survivors, and caregivers the chance to share their stories. Throughout the summer, we sat down with people we met during our journey and simply asked them to tell us about their experience with cancer.

This summer, the team conducted 30 Portraits—each one incredible in its own way. We heard stories about faith, sorrow, hope, anger, courage, love, and so much more. We are so grateful that so many were willing to share about their very personal struggles.

If nothing else, these stories affect each and every rider. They make us stronger people. They inspire us to persevere on hard days when we are biking into the wind or up a mountain. We become connected to people we never would have met and create bonds that are so strong and unique.

The Portraits Project is something that sets our organization apart from other cancer fighting organizations. It allows us to personalize cancer—something that can often seem vague and impersonal and far away. It inspires others and brings people together who wouldn't usually interact. It creates a community of powerful people who have been touched by cancer in some way. By sharing these stories, we hope to unite people, provide resources, and guide them toward a new way of thinking.

During the upcoming year, we will be revamping portraitsproject.org, sharing these wonderful stories in new ways, and connecting people all over the country. Stay tuned, because Portraits is going places!

Connecting to the Cause

The Illini 4000 seeks out opportunities to learn more about cancer research, treatment, and prevention. We also spend time interacting with members of the community affected by cancer.

New York City, NY: The 2013 team set off for New York City in the afternoon on May 22nd and started on their bikes the morning of May 24th. Within that time they had the opportunity to meet with the NYC Illini Club and the Damon Runyon Cancer Research Foundation. The team met with some of the researchers from Damon Runyon, received a tour of the facilities, and spoke with some of the scientists about their research.



Champaign and Chicago, IL: The team worked their way through Champaign and Chicago, where they were welcomed home by friends and family at the Alice Campbell Alumni Center and Millennium Park, respectively. The team had a ride-along event with Illini 4000 alumni, friends and family, as well as local cyclists out of both of these cities.

Rochester, MN: While the team was making their way west they had the opportunity to tour the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. Here they spoke with nurses and doctors to learn more about the process of cancer treatment. They were shown the chemo center and radiation equipment, and saw firsthand how a cancer patient is treated.



Salt Lake City, UT: The team dipped south towards Salt Lake City, where they again got to meet with Damon Runyon scientists at the Huntsman Cancer Institute. They heard about the research being done in this area, spoke with doctors, as well as met some patients who were being treated at this facility.

San Francisco, CA: The 2013 team finally arrived in San Francisco on July 31st, and were welcomed by the San Francisco Illinois Alumni, friends, and family to a picnic at Crissy Field Beach. Many riders stayed in the city for a couple more days before heading back to Illinois to prepare for school.
